Head coach at Virginia Tech since 1987 and has won eight national coach of the year awards in 1999 after directing the Hokies to an 11-0 regular season record and appearance in the national championship game. Tech is one of just seven Division I-A teams to receive a bowl bid each of the last eight seasons. Hokies were Big East champions three times in the 90's and three-time Big East Coach of the Year. Beamer has 98-61-2 record at Tech in becoming school's winningest coach, and has 140-84-4 record overall (six years at Murray State).

Bob Ford has been head coach at Albany since 1970 sports a 28-year record of 170-108 at Albany, while his 179 career victories (32 years) ranks among the top active NCAA Division I-AA head coaches. In 1998, he led the Great Danes to its second consecutive Eastern Football Conference championship, an EFC Atlantic Division title, and a 10-1 record, and was named the conference's Coach of the Year for the second straight fall. Ford guided his 1997 team to a school-record 11-1 mark and was named the Football Gazette Division II non-scholarship national Coach of the Year, and voted the top Region I coach by GTE and the American Football Coaches Association. He was named President of the American Football Coaches Association in January 2000.

Now in his fourth year as head coach at Purdue, Joe Tiller led the Boilermakers to the 2001 Rose Bowl, losing to fourthranked Washington to conclude an 8-4 campaign. Tiller has a 33-16 four-year record at Purdue and playing in four bowl games. He was assistant head coach at Purdue from 1983-86. He has an overall mark of 72-46-1 in nine years as a head coach. In 1997, Tiller was named National Coach of the Year by both Football News and Kickoff magazines, the GTE Region 3 Coach of the Year (Big Ten, Mid-American Conference and Conference USA) by the American Football Coaches Association and the Big Ten Dave McClain Coach of the Year. He returned to Purdue after posting a 39-30-1 record as head coach at Wyoming from 1991-96.

Bobby Bowden, head coach at Florida State the last 25 years, led FSU to the national championship last year, with the first undefeated season in Florida State history, and went wire-to-wire as the AP No. 1 team for the first time in college football history. His teams have finished in the top four of the AP polls the last 14 seasons. FSU has the winningest college football program in the country in the 1990's. Bowden has a 17-5-1 record in bowl games, highest winning percentage of alltime and ranks fifth among all coaches in career wins (315). He has coached at Samford (31-6) and West Virginia (42-26) before coming to Florida State and has a career record of 242-54-4 at FSU. He won national championship in 1993, as well as 1999.

Ron McBride has compiled a 75-53 record in his 11 years at Utah, averaging 7 wins per season while becoming the Utes' second winningest coach ever. Under McBride, the Utes have participated in five postseason bowl games. McBride's bowl credits include a 17-16 win over Fresno State in the 1999 Las Vegas Bowl and a 16-13 win over Arizona in the 1994 Freedom Bowl. Those bowl games, along with some impressive national rankings, have made Utah a national player in football. In 1994, McBride led Utah to a school record 10-2 record, and a No. 8 national ranking. In 1995, Utah tied for the Western Athletic Conference championship, Utah's first conference title since 1964.

LaVell Edwards recently retired as Head Coach at Brigham Young. He is college football's sixth all-time winningest coach. He took over BYU in 1972, coaching the Cougars to a 257-101-3 (.716) record. BYU won the National Championship under Edwards in 1984. The title was the first for the program, following a 13-0 season and a Holiday Bowl win over Michigan. Quarterbacks have thrown over 11,000 passes for Edwards, connecting on over 635 touchdowns. The passing game has racked up 100,267 yards in 28 seasons, coming to a total of about 57 miles gained through the air. The innovative offensive schemes have produced a series of NCAA record-setting quarterbacks, including 1990 Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer and NFL Super Bowl winners Jim McMahon and Steve Young. After a 20-0 loss to Arizona State on Sept. 27, 1975, the Cougars have posted an NCAA-record 312 consecutive games without being shutout.



Larry Kehres Assistant

Larry Kehres (Care-Us), who just finished his 15th year at Mt. Union College, and his teams have won 11 Ohio Athletic Conference Championships ('86, '90, '92-'00) while posting 10 undefeated regular seasons ('86, '90, '92, '93, '95-'00). Under Kehres, the Raiders have won an NCAA Division III record five Division III National Championships ('93, '96, '97, '98, '00). During the last nine regular seasons ('92-'00), his teams have posted a phenomenal 89-1 overall mark. For his efforts, Kehres (164-17-3/.899 at Mount Union) has been named the GTE Division III National Coach of the Year four times ('93, '96, '97, '98) as voted on by the AFCA.





HULA BOWLHISTORY



Over the past 55 years, the Hula Bowl All-Star Football Classic has proven to be one of the most exciting of all the post-season all-star games—a tradition of great players and coaches, Heisman Trophy winners, exciting football with exceptional fan and corporate support.

In just the last six years alone, the Hula Bowl has seen dynamic change—Rivals.com signed on as a title sponsor; the American Football Coaches Association formed an alliance with the Bowl; the game moved to Maui and War Memorial Coliseum after 51 years on the island of Oahu; and added a unique local flavoring to the naming of its all-star teams.

TITLE SPONSOR

In August of 1999, Rivals.com became the title sponsor of the Hula Bowl. Based in Seattle, the internet company boasts the world's largest network of sport's teams and specialty web sites, including over 350 college football sites. The deal with Rivals.com ended a five-year relationship with former title sponsor Hooters Restaurants of America.

The partnership with the AFCA and NCAA Football makes the Rivals.com Hula Bowl the top attraction for college football's elite seniors. Having Rivals.com as a sponsor also makes Maui the place to go for high school football's best. The company will announce its Rivals 100 All-America team of high school players in conjunction with the Hula Bowl and bring the players to Maui for the game.

FORMATS

The names of the teams have also changed through the years. The North and South all-stars were re-named to Hawaiian names Kai (ocean) and Aina (land) for the 2000 game, highlighting the game's Hawaiian theme.

When the inaugural Hula Bowl All-Star Football Classic was played on January 5, 1947, the teams were comprised of mainland college players pitted against a local team of graduates of Leiehua, a high school in Wahiawa. The

teams would play a two-game series every January until 1951, when the format was changed to allow NFL players to join Hawaiian all-stars in an effort to create a more competitive environment.

In the 1960's the Hula Bowl changed formats again, limiting play to only collegiate athletes. With this change and the increasing popularity of college football, the Hula Bowl made its way to the top of the post-season bowl games.

In 1994 the game matched local all-stars against top collegiate players from the mainland. This format was a hit for the local community but didn't attract national attention.

In stepped Bowl Games Hawaii in 1995, and the improvements in subsequent years have again stamped the Hula Bowl game as the premier allstar event.

MOVING TO MAUI

Moving the Hula Bowl game to Maui broke the longest standing tradition of the Hula Bowl—its location. After 50 years in Honolulu, an agreement was signed in April of 1997 by Bowl Games of Hawaii and County of Maui and the game was moved to Maui and War Memorial Coliseum in a move that pumped more than \$10 million in new money to the island and reinforced the tourism economy. Last year's game was played before a sellout crowd of 23,00 fans.

THE PLAYERS/GAMES

The inaugural games in 1947 were split—the mainland team winning 34-7 in game one, the Leilehua copping the second encounter, 26-20. With two great games, the Hula Bowl was an immediate hit with fans, a tradition that lasts to

this day.

In 1952, the late Doak Walker, a former Heisman Trophy winner and Detroit Lions star, played in the Hula Bowl after leading the Lions to the NFL championship. College and pro football hall of Famer Otto Graham did the same in 1955 after leading the Cleveland Browns to the NFL title.

Beginning In the 1960's, the game

attracted Heisman Trophy winners like Mike Garrett, Steve Owens, Jim Plunkett, Tony Dorsett, Billy Sims, Rashaan Salaam, Danny Wuerffel, Ricky Williams and Ron Dayne. In 1969, the game's first sellout crowd watched USC's Heisman Trophy winning tailback O.J. Simpson set a Hula Bowl record with an 88-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.

Kordell Sewart was the star the Most Valuable Player of the 1994 Hula Bowl game. He had a 72-yard run in leading his West team to a 20-9 victory over the East and his performance elevated Stewart to the 27th pick in the second round of the NFL draft, higher than predicted before his appearance in the game.

In the Golden Anniversary game in 1996, Winslow Oliver (later with the Carolina Panthers), was a major attraction with 88 yards rushing and two touchdowns, including a 53- yard TD romp that helped secure MVP honors.

Doak Walker, Otto Graham, Paul Hornung, Larry Csonka, John Mackey, Charles White, Johnny Rodgers, Anthony Davis and Billy Sims, to name a few, appeared for the Golden Anniversary celebration and a time capsule was buried at Aloha Stadium honoring the game's first 50 years. The capsule is to remain undisturbed until 2021.

In 1997, Mississippi State punter/kicker set a Hula Bowl record with 4 field goals (14 total points) and also punted for a Hula Bowl record 52-yard average.

In 1998 the first game in Maui' War Memorial Coliseum produced a thrilling 21-20 win by the South. Michigan running back Chris Howard ran for 116 yards on 14 carries while Maryland defensive end Eric Ogbogo recorded 4 quarterbacksacks as they garnered MVP honors.

Heisman trophy winner Ricky Williams of Texas rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns in the 1999 game, while last year's game—the first tie in Hula Bowl history—was highlighted by a record 12 receptions by Iowa's Bashir Yamini.



AFCAHISTORY



The improvement of the coaching profession and the sport of football has always been among the top priorities of the American Football Coaches Association since it was founded in 1922.

There were 43 coaches at the first informal meeting in 1921. The first formal meeting was held Dec. 27, 1921, in New York City at the Hotel Astor, and the Association officially came into being a few weeks later.

Since that time, the Association has grown to more than 8,000 members, including coaches from Germany, England, France, Canada, Australia, Japan and Russia. They share many of the same ideas as the founders—Amos Alonzo Stagg and John Heisman among them—and have been instrumental in developing the Association into the effective and highly respected organization that exists today.

Founding Fathers

Among the early leaders of the Association was Major Charles Daly of the U.S. Military Academy. Daly served as the AFCA's first president in 1922. He was the football coach at Army at that time and was instrumental in organizing the first meeting that eventually led to the founding of the AFCA.

Daly was succeeded by the legendary John Heisman as AFCA president in 1923. After serving as first vice president in 1922, Heisman served as president in both 1923 and 1924, becoming the first of only four men to lead the Association for two years. The remaining members of the AFCA's first Board of Trustees included secretary-treasurer J.W. Wilce of Ohio State University and trustees Robert Fisher of Harvard University and Fielding Yost of the University of Michigan.

Presidents

Virtually all of the great coaches in college football have actively participated in the AFCA. Past presidents have included such respected coaches as Bear Bryant, Alabama; Darrell Royal, Texas; Carmen Cozza, Yale; Eddie Robinson, Grambling; Bo Schembechler, Michigan; and Vince Dooley, Georgia. Bob Ford, University of Albany, is the 2000 AFCA President. He succeeded the 1999 president, Rocky Rees of Shippensburg University.

Executive Directors

The AFCA has had four full-time executive directors—DeOrmond "Tuss" McLaughry (1960-65); William D. "Bill" Murray (1968-81); Charles Y. McClendon (1982-93), and the current executive director, Grant Teaff.

Constitution, Code of Ethics

According to its constitution, the AFCA was formed, in part, to "maintain the highest possible standards in football and the profession of coaching football," and to "provide a forum for the discussion and study of all matters pertaining to football and coaching."

The Association sets forth strong ethical and moral codes. The AFCA has established a code of ethics that governs all aspects of coaching. A member who does not follow the code comes before the AFCA Ethics Committee, which is composed of his peers.

One of the primary reasons the Association was formed was to promote safety. An annual injury survey begun by the AFCA in the 1930s has provided valuable data and has led to a remarkable reduction of injuries in the sport through the years. The NCAA rules committee often follows recommendations made by the AFCA.

Membership

The American Football Coaches
Association is considered the primary
professional association for football coaches at all levels of competition. The 8,000member organization includes more than
90 percent of head coaches at the 680plus schools that sponsor football at the
college level.

The Active I membership is composed of coaches who are affiliated with four-year institutions and is responsible for determining the policies and postures of the Association. Active II members are coaches from the professional, junior college or high school coaching ranks or those who are affiliated with schools which are not members of the NCAA or NAIA. Allied members include athletic administrators, video coordinators, strength coaches or retired coaches. Other categories are Foreign membership and Life membership, which includes honorary members, 35-year members and Amos Alonzo Stagg Award recipients.

Events and Programs

The AFCA teams with *USA Today*, ESPN and Sears to select and honor national football champions. The athletics department of the AFCA Coaches' Poll champion each January receives the Sears Coaches' Trophy and a \$20,000 academic scholarship provided by Sears. The remaining NCAA and NAIA national champions also receive trophies from AFCA and Sears.

The flagship event of the Association is the annual AFCA Convention. Held each January, the convention gives the membership an opportunity to exchange ideas and provides a forum that has been beneficial to the sport and profession. During the convention, coaches of conference and national champions are honored, as well as coaches selected by their peers for superior coaching performances. In addi-

tion to the GTE Coach of the Year Award, which is voted on by the active members of the Association, AFCA committees select the Burger King Coaches' All-America teams in four divisions.

The Amos Alonzo Stagg Award and the Tuss McLaughry Award, two of the most prestigious awards given in college football, are sponsored by the AFCA and presented to deserving recipients during the convention. The Stagg Award is given for contributions to football, and the McLaughry Award is given for distinguished service to mankind.

The Assistant Coach of the Year Award was created by the AFCA to recognize assistant coaches who have distinguished themselves through on the field excellence and service to their communities.

The Good Works Team and Academic Achievement Awards are former CFA honors now being presented by the AFCA. The Good Works Team is a community service All-America team designed to recognize college football players for their community service work. The Academic Achievement Award is presented to the Division I-A school with the best graduation rate in collegefootball.

Also in 1997, the AFCA approved a scholarship program that gives a total of \$165,000 in scholarship money that is distributed between the national championship schools in the NCAA and NAIA (five schools), and the schools of the AFCA's GTE Coach of the Year winners (four schools) and Assistant Coach of the Year Award (five schools).

AFCA Selection Committee 2001 marks the fifth year that the selection of players for the Rivals.com Hula Bowl Maui falls into the hands of the American Football Coaches Association. This year's selection committee includes: F.A. Dry - Chair, Tom Bass, Hayden Fry, George Perles, Joe
